The Voices Always Give Us Away.

The Allied Commander from Kansas was President, Alaska and Hawaii still weren't states and the first Pizza Hut opened in Wichita. In the fall of 1958, the future class of 1970, 30 noisy, laughing, crying, wide-eyed kids started First Grade in a new brand-new building. Many were still only 5 years old, (kindergarten, what's that?), being somewhat under corralled by one extremely patient teacher, Mrs. Riggs. With a little school work, a lot of recesses, lunch, a nap and walking two-by-two everywhere, we learned our 123's, ABC's, how to tell time, and some Fridays, earned a trip to the pop machine where a nickel and a penny would buy a bottle of pop.

The Class of '70 was the first to attend the new McCune Grade School for a full eight years. In those days, the day started with the Lord's Prayer, the Pledge of Allegiance and in Third Grade, Mrs. Herrick played the organ while we all sang the Star-Spangled Banner, heard throughout the halls. In at least three instances, former McCune students came back as our teachers, Mrs. Hanks, Mrs. Grossnickle and Mr. Johnston. Sixth grade brought school sports and cheerleaders, the county spelling bee, marching band and dances. We were in gym class when we were told about the President being shot. That year we also started a new program, "semi-departmentalization", where the sixth, seventh and eighth grade teachers specialized in either Math, English or Social Studies and moved from room-to-room to teach those subjects to the top three grades. We graduated Eighth Grade in the spring of 1966, 30 class members all dressed up for the big event in the old High School gymnasium with its creaky floors, a balcony and rows of wooden chairs.

Looking back over the decades, the quality and devotion of our teachers and administrators seems incredible now. Of course, we didn't appreciate what we had at the time. Great teachers and administrators guided us, taught us, disciplined us through our school years. One of our English teachers became a school board member. Coach Nance taught Typing and Drafting and was an unbelievably calm Driver's Ed. teacher. Kenny Schultz coached some, taught Math with a giant slide rule and swatted wasps with a big yard stick. Ira Johnston and Mrs. Closs tried to teach us how to make things without hurting ourselves or blowing the place up. For some reason, we went through 4 English teachers in 4 years and probably never understood diagramming sentences. Carl "Droopy" Druart got us interested in government and current events but he also got roped into filming some football games from atop a breezy perch on a swaying light pole. Those were some interesting films, although not terribly beneficial to our team effort.

We had three principals during High School. Mr. David O'Neal was kind, soft spoken and laid back. Jim Knox was a big, imposing man of few words. But between those two, we inherited Louis "Mr." Brunetti who had previously been the County School Superintendent. Mr. Brunetti got us "straightened out" in a hurry. Shirts got tucked in, guys always wore a belt, and girl's skirts were the "proper length". The scuttlebutt was that one English teacher was sent home for wearing a skirt too short. There was discipline for common sense reasons. It improved the school and the lessons stuck with you the rest of your life.

The year we started First Grade, NASA was just established and put the first US satellite, Explorer 1, in space. Incredibly, only 11 years later, in the summer before our Senior year, the United States landed the "Eagle" on the moon. That

same summer, Warren McGown proved that a Chevelle could fly too, if only for a short distance. Took the mail box; left the post.

We have lost four classmates over the years. Terry Holcomb, Carlita Bell Milks, Larry Billington and Warren Dale McGown will be eternally smiling, laughing in the halls and cutting up in class.

The President of the United States when we graduated in 1970 was the same person that was Vice President when we started First Grade, Richard M. Nixon. Some things change and some remain the same. Faces, hairdos, hairlines and names may change but the voices always give us away. Small town reunions can be like the Fountain of Youth; a visit can leave one feeling renewed and invigorated. McCune is one such town. The McCune High School graduating Class of 1970 invites you to come help celebrate its 50 +1 year anniversary at Fall Festival, embrace the changes, enjoy those things that stayed the same and take a bit of McCune with you.

Admiral Claude Vernon Ricketts

(23 Feb 1906–6 Jul 1964)

Admiral Claude Vernon Ricketts, 1924 graduate of McCune Rural High School, is buried in the Arlington National Cemetery at Washington, D.C. Both of his brothers also graduated from MRHS, Lawrence in 1927, and Ralph in 1929.

The following is a success story about a former alumnus of McCune Rural High School, who graduated in 1924. He came to the McCune school system his junior year from Fair Grove, Missouri. His early education began at a one room country school near Fair Grove. Although he went through grade school in the small schoolhouse at Fair Grove, he completed high school in McCune, Kansas, where his family lived for several years before returning to the Fair Grove community.

Immediately after high school Ricketts enlisted in the U. S. Navy at the age of 17. In August 1925 after six months training in a Navy school at San Diego, California, he entered the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis on an appointment at large. He did very well and graduated in June 1929 in the top twenty-five percent of his class.

After the Naval Academy, he served for nearly a year on board the USS Lexington as a signal officer, next was assigned to the USS California and a short time later reported to the Naval Air Station, Pensacola, Florida, where he received his naval aviator wings in 1933.

As a lieutenant he was the gunnery officer on board the USS West Virginia during the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. In addition to his duties with the Anti-Aircraft battery, he helped attend the dying Captain, assisted in counter flooding the ship after it heeled over from six torpedoes and two bombs and then assisted in fire fighting against enemy planes. Due to his actions of keeping the ship upright, the USS West Virginia was later raised in 1942, repaired and put back into service in July 1944.

After instruction at various staff and war colleges Ricketts reported in June 1949 as Commanding Officer of the USS Alshain, Andromeda-class attack cargo ship. In July 1952 he became Head, Amphibious Warfare Branch, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations. Ricketts commanded the USS St. Paul, a Baltimore class cruiser, during 1955. On February 1, 1961, he became Commander, Second Fleet, and on September 25 of the same year, he assumed his last duty in the U.S. Navy as Vice Chief of Naval Operations having been nominated by President Kennedy and approved by the U. S.

Senate. While serving as Vice Chief of Naval Operations, he devoted his enormous energy and talents to many projects of importance to the U.S. Navy and the NATO alliance. On July 6, 1964, Admiral Ricketts died of a heart attack at the age of 58. He was the Navy's first seaman to rise to four-star admiral.

On July 28, 1964, USS BIDDLE was re-named and recommissioned USS CLAUDE V. RICKETTS in memory of the former Vice Chief of Naval Operations. The RICKETTS was a newly outfitted Guided Missile Destroyer and was deployed February 15, 1965. It was decommissioned in 1989. Ricketts Hall at the U. S. Naval Academy in Annapolis is also named for him.

Admiral Ricketts was awarded numerous honors and commendations for his actions at Pearl Harbor, WWII and throughout his U. S. Navy career. He demonstrated exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service in a position of great responsibility to the Government of the United States as Vice Chief of Naval Operations from November 1961 to July 1964.

Just think what he might have accomplished in his short fifty-eight years if he had spent all twelve years of school at good old MRHS. He took a course in life that led him from a Missouri farm, to McCune and to the number two post of the world's most powerful navy. Thanks to Sharon Leonard for coming across the fact that Claude Vernon Ricketts was our fellow alumn.

Thank you, Claude Vernon Ricketts, for serving your hometown communities and your country so courageously and so gallantly for so many years.





The Old McCune School

Just this spring, Greenbush Education

Center decided not to have school next year in the old McCune Elementary. This led to the question of what USD 247 would do with the school. Brad Miner Superintendent of USD 247 and the School Board decided to offer the school back to the City of McCune. The McCune City Council met with Superintendent Miner to walk through the school and evaluate its condition on June 21st, 2021. This walk through was an open meeting for the community to attend. The City Council was informed that the building was appraised for \$916,400.00 and annual taxes based off of the 2020 mil levy would be \$37,330.70 a year. The City Council is supposed to make a decision on whether or not they will accept the school into their possession or if more discussion is needed on July 13th, 2021's city council meeting.

Superintendent Brad Miner did say if the City Council decided not to accept the school, the district would look into alternative options for the building. There is one gentleman named Thomas Landrith who is interested in purchasing the school, and creating different businesses within it. Landrith expressed that he would like to create other businesses within the school such as, a recording studio, a 24 hour gym, and some other things. He was informed how much the community still used the large gym. Landrith stated that the community would still be welcome to use the large gym for programs or events if he were to become owner of the building. Superintendent Miner also expressed his concern and wishes for the community's ability to use the building whether it did sell to an individual or if the city accepted it.

The condition of the school is fair, but is in need of much repair in the old cafeteria due to water damage, the floor of the "old" gym needs resurfacing, and other things. The school is fixable, but would require funds and dedication of time. There was also talk that the school should possibly be mentioned as a historical place to the state of Kansas. There could be a chance of funding for the building with the historical relevance. There will be more information in the upcoming months of what will happen to this historical landmark of our town and alumni heritage after the City Council meets.
